Live-brary Audiobook/eBook Assistance

Beginning April 1st, Three Village Residents with valid library cards will be able to sign up for library programs from the comfort of home at any time of the day or night. Do you own a Blu-ray Player?

If yes: You may want to check out our new collection of Blu-ray discs. Search our catalog using the subject heading "Blu-ray discs" and reserve your choice today. We'll contact you when the title you want is available.

If no: Be careful when placing holds on DVDs. You will not be able to play the Blu-ray versions on a standard DVD player, so when placing reserves choose the standard DVD. Blu-ray versions are identified in two ways in the online catalog: the title is followed immediately by (Blu-ray videorecording) and the call number begins with BLU-RAY, not DVD.

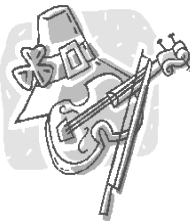

'Long Island Reads 2011' Book Discussion:

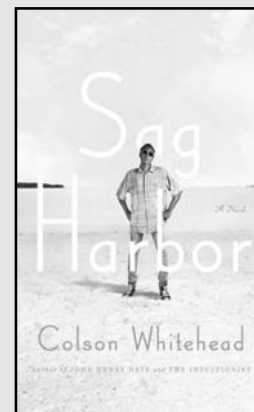
Sag Harbor by Colson Whitehead

Benji and his brother hang out with kids they've spent every summer with since they were born. In this close-knit community, some of Benji's friends are second, even third-generation Sag Harbor babies. Benji's summer adventure draws specifics from the historically African-American communities in Sag Harbor. Its status as a resort was solidified in the 1940s, when Maude Terry founded Azurest, the historically African-American community of professionals. Benji's story progresses leisurely toward Labor Day, but his reflections on what's gone before provide a roadmap to what comes later, resolving social conflicts that, at least this year, have yet to explode.
