The deadline for registering to vote is Friday, September 6, 2019.

Absentee Ballots

Applications for absentee ballots may be obtained from the Three Village Central School District Clerk beginning August 28, 2019, between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. during all days on which school is in session. Completed applications must be received by the District Clerk at least seven (7) days before the vote if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter, or the day before the vote, Tuesday, September 17, 2019, if the ballot is to be made available at the District Clerk's office located at the North Country Administration Building, 100 Suffolk Ave., Stony Brook, New York.


• Display in the lobby of Revolutionary Military Paraphernalia items dating from the Revolutionary War period, which could have been used during the time of the Culper Spy Ring.

WILLIAM COOPER: MASTER WHALEBOAT BUILDER Wed., Sept. 4, 12:30 – 1:45 p.m.



William Cooper of Sag Harbor manufactured over 900 whaleboats carried aboard whaling ships, from 1820-1850, during the height of the whaling industry. A leading citizen of Sag Harbor, where his fine home still stands, Cooper was also an investor in whale ships, railroads and more. Presenter

Frank Turano has worked on Cooper's papers, which document much about 19th century life on Long Island and which are housed at the Long Island Museum.




